12 Teaching Communication Skills to Children with Autism During an assessment, the child is given more time to process language than during typical everyday exchanges In the typical assessment, the clinician directs activities and communication The ability to initiate communication (a common problem with autism) is often not evaluated

The Importance of Communication Skills in Young Children

elaboration (ie, learning more complex language skills) Communication is essentially a symbol-manipulating system that is present in very young children and that increases in complexity with age (Pinker, 1999) During the early childhood years, responsive families and teachers are critical for rich stimulation of children's communication

□ Children who have, or at risk of, early language delay (not achieving expected levels of progress in the development of their communication skills) Poor communication skills are closely linked with social disadvantage, and in areas of high social deprivation in the UK up to 56% of children start school with language delay¹

EARLY INTERVENTION: COMMUNICATION AND LANGUAGE ...

- Communication skills such as talking, listening, and understanding
- Social and emotional skills such playing and feeling secure and happy
- Self-help skills such as being able to feed and dress one's self

Communicating with Children

communication involves understanding people: their needs, skills, beliefs, values, societies and cultures, and that communication is a two-way process for sharing ideas and knowledge
